


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
Who is on Medicaid in Pennsylvania?











"Waiving" work goodbye in Food Stamps



Medicaid and Food Stamp Error Rate

- National error rate: 20% \$80 billion in fraud and waste
- 87% due to lack of documents and "eligibility errors"
- Beware the Claims of "Improvement" in Error rates in PA – closer to 20% in Medicaid and CHIP, and 14% in Food Stamps



Bloomsburg, Pa. — A Shickshinny woman is facing felony charges for lying about her income to get food stamps, officials say.

Regina C. Slipper, 47, reportedly took thousands of dollars in SNAP benefits for which she wasn't eligible, then bragged about "screwing the system."

According to Ruth Gola of the Office of State Inspector General:

On Jan. 12, the Columbia County Assistance Office began investigating a tip that Slipper was lying about her household income in order to receive SNAP benefits. Agents reviewed her income statement and benefits, which showed Slipper had received \$4,588 in SNAP benefits from August of 2022 though March of 2023.

What can we do right now in Medicaid?

- Mandate increased oversight and approval of "unwinding" waivers and state plan amendments
- Stop allowing self-attestation (income/household composition)
- More robust data cross-checks
- 3-strikes hospital presumptive eligibility rules



Big opportunities in 2025?

- Medicaid Work requirement waiver
- Hospital presumptive eligibility waiver
- Fraud lockout waiver
- Biannual redeterminations waiver
- Enrollment cap waiver

Food Stamp reforms

- Broad Based Categorical Eligibility (BBCE)
- ABAWD work requirement waivers (188,000 able-bodied with no kids in house)
- Mandatory E&T for all work registrants (Another 320,000+)
- "Simplified" reporting



Unemployment Insurance

Less fraud and more accountability

- Lots of Fraud in Pennsylvania
 - Over \$1 BILLION in state fraud in 2020 and 2021
 - \$6 BILLION in federal pandemic UI fraud in Pennsylvania
- Plenty of ways to fix the Fraud and the UI Program
 - 1. Verify who's getting the checks
 - 2. Fewer weeks to find a job
 - 3. Look for work more often
 - 4. Show up for interviews
 - 5. Lock out fraudsters

- **Right-size benefits**
- **Promote work**
- **Stop fraud**

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Indexing benefits

What Happened in States that **Indexed UI Benefits?**

Unemployment trust funds Replenished.

- North Carolina up \$5.7 billion
- Kansas increased by 900 percent to nearly \$1 billion.
- Florida built up its trust fund to \$3.9 billion by 2018

Back to work more quickly vs. non-indexing states.

- North Carolina and Florida cycled off the program nearly twice as quickly as individuals in non-indexing states.
- Kansas: four weeks sooner than pre-indexing.

A stronger workforce and lower UI taxes on businesses.

- North Carolina saw employer taxes drop by 75%.
- Florida, reduced unemployment taxes by 79%.



Promote Work



Require employers to REPORT REFUSALS

South Carolina: The Department of **Reemployment NOT Unemployment**








Program **Integrity:** Stop

CROSSCHECK and VERIFY

- Cross-check State and federal death records
- **Cross-check State and federal incarceration records**
- Cross-check with the new hires databases
- **Verify** claims from IP addresses outside of the state
- Verify claims for residence and identity when multiple claims are associated with the same bank account or address


